This collaboration accelerates the realization of new trails and amenities; and, united by common goals, the alliance boosts capacity and effectiveness. Case studies spotlight successful joint ventures, illustrating their dedication to advancing trail expansion in Pierce County.	
	Gala	Silver Star Vision Plan - Collaborating to Modernize A Trail System	The Silver Star Vision Plan is a timely case study in re-imagining an outdated trail system across a beautiful and varied landscape within eyesight of the Portland-Vancouver Metropolitan Area. Over the course of several years representatives with diverse perspectives including trail user groups, the Cowlitz Tribe, Washington Department of Natural Resources and U.S. Forest Service came together with the National Park Service Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance Program to write the plan. Vision plans are typically short on specifics but instead provide the conceptual idea of a place to which future planning efforts should align. Does my project idea need a vision plan? How do you do planning across agency boundaries? How does this type of planning relate to modernizing a trail system? This presentation will address these questions and offer lessons learned in the process.

Friday Oct 4	Orchard South	East Fork Mission Creek: Restoring Habitat through Collaborative Recreation Planning	Chelan County Natural Resources (CCNRD), USFS and Evergreen MTB staff collaborated to address habitat and water quality issues in East Fork Mission Creek caused by an unraveling road prism within the floodplain and both moto and non-moto recreational uses within the stream channel. Through a variety of funding sources, a 3 mile trail re-route, a road section closure, and habitat/water quality restoration effort was planned and constructed to improve steelhead habitat and water quality in East Fork Mission Creek. The project successfully restored a severely damaged 2.8 mile reach of the East Fork Mission Creek AND provided a high quality recreational trail experience. Collaboration between agencies involved successfully improved water quality and habitat for the ESA listed steelhead within the East Fork Mission Creek, while simultaneously improving the user experience for the public.

	Fuji	Career Pathways & Partnerships for BIPOC Early Professionals	In 2020, Washington Trails Association (WTA) launched its Emerging Leaders Program (ELP) to invest in paid development opportunities for future leaders in the outdoor industry, specifically for communities who experience inequitable access to the outdoors, including BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and people of color) individuals. The 14-week program provides hands-on training in technical trail skills, leadership and professional development. Over the last four years, the program has evolved and expanded to engage agency partners and several community organizations. In collaboration with Washington State Parks, the program has been funded for three years through the WA state legislature. Sixty-five percent of program alumni have gone on to work at WTA or partner

			organizations. The program offers career paths for early professionals of color and builds stronger connections between WTA, Washington State Parks and local communities.
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	Gala	Northup Connector - Building Sustainable Trails for the Future through Partnerships and Creative Funding	The Northup Connector, while a short segment of trail, represents the culmination of years of planning to make an important connection between two major trail routes, to transit, and to an area of employment and economic development, completing a key link in a resilient trail system. It wouldn't have been possible without creative partnerships and funding. Led by Eastrail Partners on behalf of King County, with funding from Meta and REI, this is a unique project bringing funding from the private sector directly to the trail. Eastrail Partners used a progressive design-build contracting approach to meet a fast-track schedule. Using this approach, the contractor was able to contribute to a value engineering process that ensured the project also met budgetary constraints. Developed over the past decade and now in its very final development phase, this non-motorized trail network caters to hikers and mountain bikers, and creates a back-country outdoor recreation experience less than 5 miles from downtown Wenatchee. The network includes a network of progression trails to provide a range of looped trail experiences, a community gathering facility, a mountain bike skills park, road and trailhead infrastructure upgrades, and is now the site of community events

A combination of conservation, economic and social benefit, as well as exceptional user experiences makes No2 Canyon one of the most unique and comprehensive trails systems in WA State.

This non-motorized multi-use trail network opened in April 2024 as a collaboration between the Snoqualmie Tribe, Si View Parks District, the City of North Bend, and the Evergreen Mountain Bike Alliance. The small park is North Bend's first in-town and dense network of hiking and progression mountain bike trails, developed on in-fill lots with a keen eye on integrating native imagery and language to connect the trail user to the lands, the tribe, and native language to encourage mindful recreation and trail stewardship. This session explores the planning, process, construction, and collaboration of many stakeholders to bring the project vision to reality.

	Orchard North	Finding Solitude in Indian Heaven Wilderness	The Cascade Volcanoes Chapter of the Great Old Broads for Wilderness has completed its 7th season of partnering with the U.S. Forest Service to monitor Solitude on trails in Washington and Oregon wilderness areas. During 2023, volunteers logged more than 500 hours during 20 trips within Washington's Indian Heaven Wilderness to fulfill project requirements. Data collected included counting the number of visitors noted in the wilderness during daylight hours. This data set was submitted to the U.S. Forest Service and will assist the Mt. Adams Ranger District in increasing scores for solitude quality of wilderness. Funding was provided by the National Wilderness Stewardship Alliance. Great Old Broads for Wilderness is a women-led national grassroots organization that engages and inspires activism to preserve and protect wilderness and wild lands. Our vision is to ensure that wild public lands are treasured for their intrinsic values and protected for current and future generations.	
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	Orchard South	Northwest Motorcycle Association: An Organization Built for and by All Dirt Bike Riders	The NMA is dedicated to the preservation and stewardship of motorized trails across Washington State. Doing so requires countless volunteers with a variety of skills and knowledge of a multitude of topics. Our members have risen to the challenge and are what has made us successful since incorporation in 1971. While traditionally a sport comprised mostly of young adult males, the dirt bike riding community has always included a wide range of people from all walks of life. Over time the demographics have slowly shifted to better align with society as a whole, both organically and by intentional actions by leaders within our sport, specifically within the NMA. Involving more youth and expanding involvement to historically under-represented riders is critical to our continued strength and future successes. We are actively taking steps to invite, welcome, educate, involve and empower more riders from more walks of life.

	Fuji	Engaging the Next Generation of Environmental Stewards	A discussion on the ways conservation and service corps are supporting equitable and inclusive opportunities for young people to develop skills and have a positive impact on natural resources and climate related challenges.
	Gala	Charting the Course: Collaboration, Innovation, and Sustainability along the Oregon Coast Trail	Traversing Oregon's coastline from border to border, the Oregon Coast Trail (OCT) travels roughly 400 miles across beaches, forests, and rivers. The OCT is part of the Oregon Signature Trails Vision, which designates trails that expand access to iconic places and increase the economic impact and sustainability of Oregon's outdoor recreation. However, more than 150 miles of gaps along the trail limit continuous access for hikers. The OCT Action Plan is a collaborative effort that bridges government agencies, tribes, coastal communities, and private landowners to establish long-term goals and near-term actions for bringing the OCT vision to life in a sustainable manner. This presentation will highlight the challenges and successes of working to close the gaps along this iconic trail that traverses more than 30 communities across 7 counties, and will describe how the Action Plan supports OCT partners as they improve, maintain, and repair the OCT in the years to come. We will provide attendees with lessons learned and "toolkit" strategies for thinking through balancing cost, funding sources, trail maintenance, amenities, equitable trail access, environmental factors, cultural sites, geographical barriers and concerns, and multiple agencies/landowners to equip agencies with action items to move trail projects forward. We will also invite attendees to explore questions around trail management and maintenance strategies, including how to navigate managing trails that cross multiple landowners, how to maintain trails that feel safe and welcoming for everyone, and how to provide better access for and inclusion of local communities and residents.
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	Orchard North	A Repurposing Project with a Purpose	The Northern State Hospital campus grounds were originally designed by the Olmsted Brothers in the early 1900's. In its heyday, the mental institution used the concept of a working farm, with patients cultivating the gardens and caring for the stock and poultry. After closing in 1973, the daily pilgrimage of patients moving from the hospital to the farm subsided. It didn't take long before pedestrian bridges fell victim to gravity and trails to become lost to nature. Forty years after closing, a new partnership formed with the mission of restoring trails, rebuilding bridges, and reconnecting the campus routes. This mission includes a "parkscription"

			component to help restore some of the mental health aspects that trails and nature provide. Our presentation will showcase how a little seed blossomed and the landscape was cultivated for public benefit.	
	Orchard South	Washington State Scenic Bikeways Program	Did you know Washington state is getting a Scenic Bikeways program? The legislature directed WA State Parks and Recreation Commission to create a new statewide program under RCW 79A.05.800, intended to highlight cycling routes throughout the state. What is a Scenic Bikeway? A Scenic Bikeway is a cycling route with exceptional scenic, cultural, historic, and/or recreational value and can be located on existing roadways, trails, bike lanes, shared use paths or some combination thereof. State Parks has been busy working with our partners and stakeholders to develop a framework for the program and hopes to launch it soon. Come to this session and learn more about the route nomination and evaluation processes, how the program will integrate with other trails, agencies, and organizations across the state, and how you and your community can get involved!
